**“FROM A BOY TO A MAN”
A SOLIDERS STORY**

(Real names will not be revealed)

A small town in Eastern Tennessee a poor family tried to make ends meet by cultivating a farm, raise hogs, chickens, and even hunt for their food when necessary, as times were hard in the south. The family of this home consisted of the Grandfather, Grandmother, and a Mother a Father, their Daughter, and two Sons. All the males were taught to handle and shoot guns and an early age usually around 5 years of age. Most families would train their boys with a 16 gauge shotgun and a single shot 22 rifle back in the early 1950's and before. It came time for the youngest boy to have his turn behind the barn, where some targets were placed on the side of a hill, usually a piece of wood, of some sort. The grandfather and father were very good with both weapons, and were always happy to teach the boys of not only the immediate family but of cousins, and nephews. The young boy was excited to have his first lesson. The grandfather started him off with the shotgun knowing that the recoil would be hard for the youngster. The grandfather and father helped him hold the shotgun up for the first few times, until he was use to the sound and the kick of the shotgun. After a few days the boy was doing well so the father wanted to have him try the 22 rifle. He showed the boy how to use the sights on then rifle. He would hold his head on a little bit of an angle which would make the rifle on an angle also. Eventually he caught on and held it in the right position. From the first shot the youngster was able to hit the targets with almost every shot. After a few weeks the boy was very adept with the rifle. The father praised his son telling he is the best shot he has ever seen. Some months passed and the boy was hunting rabbits and squirrels on his own.

A few months after the boys 6th birthday times really hit hard. The grandfather had to sell some of the hogs, and chickens to buy seeds to plant and to buy salt, sugar, and flour. But it came a time when it was almost impossible to feed the entire family. The young lad's father saw an ad in a magazine while looking for a job in town that stated a man and woman were looking to adopt or take a child into custody for \$500.00 payment. The father ripped the ad out of the magazine and took it home to show his wife and his mother and father. They talked about it for days, and made the decision to call the people to have them adopt the youngster. The young boy was adopted 8 months after his 6th birthday he thought he was put into a car to go visit some cousins like he had before. After some time with his new mother and father in Topeka, Kansas he wanted to go home to see his family. The new mother and father were getting tired of him mopeing and crying so they took him to Atchison, Kansas to place him in the Kansas Children's Receiving Home. They met a man called Mr. Thompson who was in charge, and surrendered the boy into the Home's care. The young boy was taken to a room with 9 other boys on the third floor. All the girls were on the second floor. Everyone had chores to do, and had some outside play time after lunch and dinner. After a few day he attached himself to a girl about his same age her name was Christine.

Throughout the weeks, months, and years they became very good friends. At the age of 15 Mrs. Thompson ask the young man to come to the office for a visit. He arrived and said did I do something wrong Mrs. Thompson? No you did not do anything wrong! But I have some good news for you. Your Grandfather has been searching for you a long time and he is on his way from Tennessee to bring you home. He was so excited that he ran out of the office yelling I'm going home, I'm going home, he ran outside down the one side of the stairs and up the other side and back into the building.

During the next week Christine was adopted, they both were so happy for each other. Mr. Thompson told the young man that his Grandfather would be here tomorrow afternoon to pick him up and take him back home. That morning Christine new parents were there to take her to her new home. The young man and the young woman hugged for a long time and told each other they would never forget each other. He ran up to his room to watch her drive away. He watched them get into a car and drive around the circular driveway headed for the main highway. He watched until they went behind the trees along the highway. About two hours later Mr. & Mrs. Thompson came to the room and ask the boys in the room to leave for a while they needed to talk to the young man.

Mr. Thompson who was an Army Veteran took charge right at the start. He said look son we have some terrible news for you! There was a bad car accident a couple of hours ago, out on the highway, and Christine and her new mother were killed in the accident, and her new father was severely injured. The other car that caused the accident was your grandfather's car and he was killed also. A few days past and Mrs. Thompson approached the young man telling him his grandfather's family had his body shipped back to Tennessee. He ask if they knew his grandfather's last name. Mrs. Thompson told him the last name and the town where he lived. At this time you could only stay in the Receiving Home until the age of 16. Mr. & Mrs. Thompson ask the young man to come and visit them at their home. They told him he could stay until he reached 18.

As the young man walked into the office of Mr. Thompson he looked at a number of pictures and awards that Mr. Thompson had displayed around the office from his time in the Army. Mr. Thompson told the young man that he had to work in the hardware store Mr. & Mrs. Thompson owned on the edge of town. He was happy to do so. Mr. & Mrs. Thompson purchased him two sets of

new clothes to wear to work. The young man was happy and earned a little money while working and paying his way in the Receiving Home. He ask Mr. Thompson a lot of questions about the Army and that he would to join the Army when he gets older. Well 18 years of age came faster than he thought, and Mr. Thompson told him he was on his own and would have to leave. The young man said his good byes and bought a ticket on a Greyhound Bus back to East Tennessee.

He went to the post office with one piece of luggage in hand to find out the address of his family. He then ask if they could give him directions to the Route number, which they did. It was a five mile walk. When he arrived only his grandmother was there, she gave him lots of hugs and kisses. He just wanted to know two questions. Why did mom and dad get rid of me? What did I do wrong? She explained how hard the times were back then, and he understood. She told him that his family had moved to Chicago where his father found a good paying job. He spent two weeks with her helping out on the farm as much as he could. Then he told her he was going to Chicago to find them, and ask if she had an address, which she wrote down for him. He headed back to town to buy a ticket to Chicago on a Greyhound bus. It seemed like weeks to get to Chicago because the bus had to drive routes to other cities to drop off and pick up new passengers. In Chicago he ask the clerk behind the counter if he knew how to get to the address on the paper his grandmother wrote down for him. The old gray gentleman said sure, and turned over the paper and wrote down the directions. The young man arrived at the address and saw it was an apartment building. He knocked on a few doors and ask if they knew what unit his parents lived in? An elderly lady told him they have not lived here in a few years. He ask if she knew where they moved to, which she replied no I don't know. He had no place to go or live and was short on money. He walked down the outside stairs and looked in both directions. He decided to go left and reached a viaduct, and saw people living under it. He ask an old gray African gentleman with

a walking cane if he could stay there for a few days? The old man told him we welcome everyone here, and you can stay as long as you like. After a week or so he went to a phone booth to see if he could find his mothers and fathers name and address in the phone book. He found three names as the same as his fathers. He stopped in a Gulf gas station to buy a map to find the streets he was looking for. At the second home he found his mother, father, sister and brother. They invited him in and sat him down at the table to eat something. He was so happy and told his family he knew God would help him find them. They sat and talked for hours. The young man ask if he could stay with them until he got a job to pay his own way. Mom looked at dad and dad said sure, but you will have to get a job soon. The very next day he went looking for a job. He was walking down a side street when he saw some men loading pipes into a truck from a garage set back from a home. He ask if they needed a worker. The man told him the boss is in the garage ask him, which he did and the boss told him we will give you a try and see how it works. The pay is \$2.75 per hour for laborers. You can start today if you want or first thing in the morning. We start at 7:30 every day, and sometimes we work Saturday and Sunday. I'll start today stated the young man! All the young man had on was a pair of good shoes, Levi jeans and a dress shirt. The boss ask him what size shoes do you wear. He told the boss he didn't know, all my shoes were given to me by someone else, and went on to explain to him how and where he grew up and went on to explain how he found his real mother and father and where they lived. The boss went to the back of the garage and found a pair of his sons old work boots and gave them to him. The young man told him I will pay for them as soon as I can, in which the boss said you don't have to just take care of them. He had noticed a picture above the desk in the garage of a few men standing in front of an Army tank, an ask if that was him, he replied yes me and some old buddies.

The young man told him he was going to join the Army soon. That's great replied the boss. He was given some paper work to fill out, but didn't know where to put down as his address, which the man said put down this address on this card as he handed him a business card. I don't have a social security number stated the young man. The man told him to just sit here until I get these men off to work. Off the men went and the boss put his hand out to shake with the young man and told him his name. I will take you back to your parents' house and get a copy of your birth certificate and take you to the Social Security office and the Selective Service for you to register, and we'll go from there. They stopped by to talk to his mother and get his Birth Certificate and off they went.

The man walked him through every step of the forms. When they were finished they stopped at a small restaurant to get something to eat. I'll pay you back for this sir when I can. He said don't call me sir anymore, and you don't have to pay me back. After lunch, he was dropped off on a job site where the foreman gave him a shovel and a pick ax, and showed him where to dig and how deep. They were putting plumbing underground in an apartment building. All the young man could think of while he was working was he couldn't wait to tell his father that he had a job, on the first day. When he was dropped off at the boss's home he ran all the way to dad's home to tell him the good news, but his dad wasn't home from work yet. Later on when dad came home he ran out to the driveway to tell him the good news. Dad was happy for him. After dinner while watching the news on TV the young man told his family that he was going to join the Army. Mom and Dad said almost at the same time if you do we will never talk to you again. He ask them why. Mom said why would you want to kill people. So he dropped the subject for now. He thought about it for days at work. But thinking about joining was not an option any more. He received a notice in the mail to report for a physical from the Selective Service that he is being drafted into the military. He was happy that it was not a choice anymore.

He went in for the physical and passed. A couple of weeks passed and he received his notice to report to Midway Airport for a flight to St. Louis Missouri and a bus ride to Fort Leonard Wood for basic training.

He went through basic without any problems, and was on his way to Advance Individual Training at Aberdeen Proving Ground for Officer Candidate and Schooling. After his training was complete he was approached by three men in street clothes and ask if would be interested in enrolling for a special mission. He told them sure, I'll do all I can for my Country. Well these men had compiled 70 men from around the country for this special mission. But none of them knew what the mission would be. They all were brought into a class room and were given papers to sign, for they were being discharged from the Army as of today. Few of the men raised their hands to ask why were we being discharged, did we do something wrong. No said the one named Robert smith, which was all three of their name. After you sign those papers you will sign some more papers and you will be the responsibility of the Department of Defense. They all went through more training with the DOD training personnel at Aberdeen. After three months of training 52 men made it through, the young man was one of them and he was so proud of himself. During this time he wrote home every week, but never received any response from mom or dad.

Number two Robert Smith ask him why he never received any mail from home. He told him the story about his parents didn't want him in the service. Well, all 52 men packed up their gear and boarded a plane to Oakland Army Terminal, from there they landed somewhere to refuel and then to Phan Rang Air Force Base in Vietnam. Where they were given instructions on keeping their mouths closed when talking about their mission with anyone. The group was told they were now members of the Phoenix Operation and all their missions were top secret, and not to be disclosed to anyone. They were broken down to 12 men per group, and one leader for each group so the unlucky # of 13 per group. Each leader received a package from Mr. Smith which were their orders. Now Robert Smith number 1 said if you come out of the

mission alive you will have completed your time in the military, and receive an Honorable Discharge. The young man wrote letters every day to his family, but still never received any answer from home. The mission they all were given would take however long it would to complete it. Well when each group's mission was completed 6 months had passed, only 21 men were left alive. These young men gave their lives for their family and their country. The survivors didn't get to see their buddies' bodies shipped back home because they didn't know until the missions were completed. They were transported to some airport in far South Vietnam, there they boarded a plane and off they went. After a couple of stops to refuel they landed at Nellis Air Force Base in Nevada from there they were sent to Tonopah Test Range for de-briefing, which took a full month. Each man was given plane tickets from McCarran Airport to their home town. When the young man arrived at O'Hare Airport he was surprised to see men and women in their respected Military uniforms of choice. He grabbed his Duffle Bag and hopped into a cab to head home. When he arrived he jumped out as fast as he could, and knocked on the door hoping to see his mom, dad, sister or brother instead he saw a complete stranger. She asked if she could help him. He asked if his mother and father still lived here, she told him no they moved about 18 months ago. He asked her if she knew where they moved to, she replied no she didn't know, but she thought it was Kentucky. He walked a few blocks away to talk to his old boss, to find out how they were doing, but new people lived there also and told him that he retired and moved to Arizona. He had no place to go and didn't know what to do. He threw almost everything out of his duffle bag to make it lighter. By this time it started to get dark so he started walking back to the old Viaduct where he once lived. He found the old gray man still staying there. Again he asked if he could stay for a while. The old man said we welcome all. He went out looking for work every day, and finally landed a job playing with a shovel and pick again. This time he paid attention what the Plumbers were doing.

After a few months the boss ask him if he would like to become an apprentice. He replied yes. The boss told him with all the work they had that he would have to attend Night school two times a week. That's fine with me he said. Well after a couple of years he wanted to see if he could find his family. He wrote to every county seat in Kentucky he found several people with his father's name but none were him. He had rented an apartment after he received his apprenticeship papers and finally had enough money to buy a decent bed. He made arrangements to have it delivered and setup. One night while he was switching channels on the TV he came in on a movie called Raintree County which was filmed in Kentucky. The following week he as the boss he could have off Thursday, Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, that he wanted to see if he could find his family. He headed off Wednesday night after work. He was going to the far south eastern county and work his way east. He finally reached Adair County first looking in the phone books for his dad's name, and he found two similar names. He called the first one and his mom answered. He said hello mom it's me! She said what do you want! I am in town and would like to come and see you and dad. She said you can come but you can't stay long. He stopped at the County Court house to ask for directions. The two ladies behind the country said hold on we will get someone who could help. Well off he went and he was so excited. He stepped out of the car and walked up to the front porch where mom and dad were sitting. He went to give mom a hug she stuck her arms out and said we will have none of that. Dad said what do you want? Just wanted to stop and see how you were doing. Mom got up to answer the phone so he ask dad if he could have some water his dad told him there was a hose on the side of the house. In about fifteen minutes or so he saw his brother coming up the gravel driveway. He jumped up to hug his brother and was met with a punch in the face. His brother grabbed a hand full of hair

And threw him back in his car and told him we don't want any women and baby killers around us, and slammed the car door on his arm. He stopped back at the court house to ask where the nearest V.A. Clinic or Hospital was. He was told the VA Lexington Health Care facility and was given directions to their location. The clerk ask him what had happened to him. He told her the hood of his car hit him in the face and smashed his arm. At Lexington they set his arm as it was broken and cleaned up his face. He made it back home on Saturday evening and went right to bed.

From that day on he took his brothers and sisters in the Chicago Plumbers Union as his family of brothers and sisters. He went on and married and had five children which one passed. He gave them the best life he could. Most of his life he had not many negatives to say about anyone.

Dear Mr. Howard: Thank you for contacting me about a cost of living adjustment (COLA) for our veterans. I appreciate hearing from you. The Veterans' Compensation COLA Act (S.777), introduced by Senator Jon Tester of Montana, would increase compensation to veterans with service-connected disabilities, their dependents, and survivors of disabled veterans. Ensuring that our veterans and their families receive adequate compensation after their service to our country is the least we can do to show our gratitude.

This additional assistance is desperately needed. Veterans are much more likely to experience homelessness than the general population and often suffer from various health ailments connected to their service. While the Biden Administration has cut veteran homelessness by 11 percent since 2020, direct payments have been proven to aid in reducing the instances of homelessness. President Biden's Fiscal Year (FY) 2024 Budget Request calls for \$325 billion in assistance for our veterans, which is a 5 percent increase from the FY 2023 Budget Request.

On March 30, 2023, the Veterans' Compensation COLA Act passed the Senate by unanimous consent. The bill now awaits consideration in the House of Representatives. I will be sure to keep your thoughts in mind should any related legislation come before the Senate.

“THIS IS WORKING WELL WITH OTHERS”

“WORKING WELL WITH OTHERS”

I anticipate we all can remember a time years ago when our Societies, Unions, Organizations, Programs etc. began. We all look back with the understanding of how our fore fathers had the ambition taking on the task of starting out and understanding where we were headed in the future. What those meeting were like in the beginning is what I speak of all the time now. **“Working Well With Others”**. The fore fathers had to meet not only with those in their specific trade but with other that needed to be included on the education of what was to be included in building their organization. It occurred to me that a simple reference on what was to be noted on the startup was not quit enough information to begin at a meeting, they needed more information from others. Imagine how many meetings they had to have before they had to present it to their specific State for acceptance to become a Bill to a Law to a Statute. Here is how that process would have taken place in the early days. After a Bill was introduced in either the Senate or the House of Representatives it is passed by that chamber of origin, it is engrossed and forwarded as An Act to other chambers for consideration. When passed by the other chamber, it was documented and forwarded to the President. The Act shall be approved by the President or if vetoed, then two-thirds of the Senate and the House of Representatives.

The terms Act, Law and Statute are interchangeable. After approval Statutes are forwarded to the Law Revision Counsel in the House for review in preparation for printing and dissemination to the public. **“Working Well With Others”** to move things forward step by step is the way organizations become bigger and bigger. Before any organization moves forward with business they shall create a set of By-Laws designed for their specific needs. This process will take some doing from the Board Members, and possibly an attorney. A great additions to our programs is when women became interested, and were welcomed with open arms.

Types of Wrongful Termination in Illinois

There are three main exceptions to the at-will presumption in Illinois, and these exceptions make it illegal for employers to fire an employee for reasons that fall under the following categories:

Discrimination – It is against the law for an employer in Illinois to terminate an employment relationship for discriminatory reasons, or because of the employee’s membership in a protected category, such as age, race, religion, sex, national origin or disability. Illinois employees who believe they have been fired on the basis of a protected characteristic may have a wrongful termination claim against their employer.

Retaliation – An employee’s termination from employment may be considered wrongful if the employer’s action were in retaliation for the employee engaging in legally proper or necessary activities, such as claiming minimum wage, opposing workplace discrimination, “whistleblowing,” or filing for workers’ compensation. **Violation of public policy also falls under this category, which means Illinois employers cannot legally fire an employee for refusing to perform an illegal act, for reporting a violation of the law, for exercising a statutory right, or for fulfilling certain civic duties.**

Breach of contract – If an employee has a written, oral or implied employment contract that promises job security or protects the employee from termination without cause, the employer may have to show proof that the employment discharge is based on job performance, the company’s financial hardship, or another qualifying factor, in order to avoid charges of wrongful termination.



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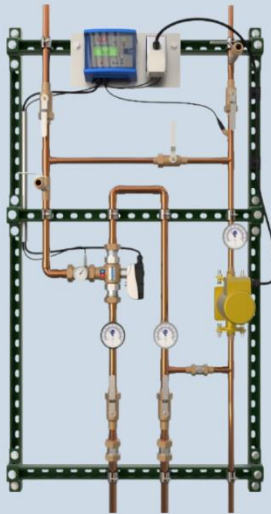
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Typical Installation Diagram

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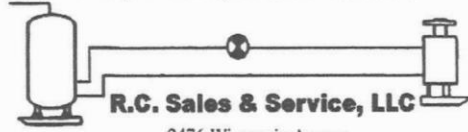

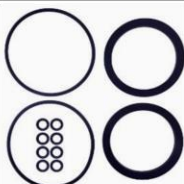
